

Role of the Board

Protect the Public

 Ensure enough well-educated providers to meet the public need



- Licensees are generally rule followers
- Most don't know the rules.
- Part of your responsibility is to better educate them.

- Newsletter
 - Inform on current concerns and best practice
 - Rule changes and what they mean
 - Context of disciplinary actions
 - Avoid "legalese"

- Chiropractors employ 280,000 people


Reactive Education

- Role of "Reactive Education" is to rehabilitate and reorient a practitioner
 - Live vs Static
 - Interactive vs Lecture
 - Projects/Tests vs Mere Attendance
 - Linear vs. One-Time



Reactive Education


■ PBI teaches "The Formula"



- It is the interplay between
 - Risk Factors
 - Vulnerabilities
 - Resistances
 - Balanced by Accountability

Risk Factors

- Specialty Dependent
- Patient Population
- Age/Sex of Patients
- Inconsistent Use of Chaperones
- Poor Documentation
- Newer/Older Providers
- Solo vs. Group Practice
- Lack of Policies and Procedures
- Employee Turnover/Staffing Issues



Vulnerabilities


- Mental Status
- Difficulty Saying "NO"
- Savior Complex
- Avoidance of Conflict
- Co-Dependency
- Burnout
- Personal Problems





Resistance

- Denial
- Projections
- Avoidance
- Humor
- Passive Aggression
- Inattentiveness
- Empire Building
- Rationalization/Justification
- Other-Blaming



Accountability

- Supervision
- Consultation
- Personal Therapy
- Mentoring/Coaching
- Monitoring
- Policies and Procedures
- Knowing Statute, Rules, Codes of Ethics, Newsletters
- Chaperons



Reactive Education

- PBI focuses on the "Four Rules"
 - Everyone has violation potential
 - Perception is reality
 - Protect yourself at all times
 - The Board is always right.



Reactive Education

- The goal of reactive education:
 - Ensure an understanding of the violation and why it occurred
 - Build the tools necessary to learn and grow from the experience
 - Prevent a repeat of the past
 - Create structures to build accountability
 - Spread the knowledge



Hearing/Asking For Insight

- Reactive Education depends:
 - What has the licensee done proactively?
 - Can the licensee demonstrate insight?
 - Can the licensee show concrete examples?
 - Are those mitigating factors sufficient to correct the issue?
 - Are the issues isolated or systemic?









Asking About Insight

- Since the goal is both protecting the public and to meet the public need, critical to balance this mission
 - If the licensee can demonstrate insight, explore and understand.
 - If insight is limited, education takes on a greater need
 - View your role as offering solutions

Collateral Consequences

- Often the Respondent's concern in resolving issues with the Board are the collateral consequences. Think of how to overcome this issue:
 - Perceptions matters Findings of Fact and
 Conclusions of Law are critical to licensees
 - Impact beyond the Order/Stipulation
 - Focus on Improvement




Goal of Education

- Save the licensee from a lack of knowledge
- Increase the licensee's awareness
- Help them help themselves
- Create a better patient outcome
- Increase satisfaction in the practice community for both licensees and patients



Does It Work

- A recent study by PBI with a sample size of 210:
 - \blacksquare Primary recidivism -2.9% (6)
 - Secondary recidivism -6.7% (14)
 - Followed graduates from 6 to 11 years.
